




1. Academic Information

Curriculum



APS: Areas of Study

The College of Asia Pacific Studies has established four Areas of Study in order to conduct education and research for the development of wide-ranging problem solving ability and specialized know-how of the issues facing the Asia Pacific region. Studies are centered on solid language proficiency and a basic understanding of the diverse cultures, histories, societies, natural environments, and historical conditions of the Asia Pacific region. As a part of graduation requirements, students must choose and register one Area of Study from the following and then complete at least **2 credits** from the required subjects (Common Liberal Arts Subjects) for the Area of Study of your choice and **28 credits** from the Major Education Subjects for the Area of Study.
