What is the Academic Calendar?

- A calendar that shows the annual university schedule. Each year is divided into 2 semesters, and each semester is further split into 2 quarters and a session.
- The Spring Semester starts in April, and the Fall Semester starts in October.
- A session is a weeklong class period at the beginning of each of the long vacations.



Fall Semester: Classes are taught over 2 months, either from October to November (1st Quarter) or from December to January (2nd Quarter)

Course Formats

Courses are offered in one of two formats: “In-person” or “Distance Learning (Online/On Demand)”.

Please check both the syllabus and course timetable for information about the class format for each course.

Course Format		How to Attend Classes
In-person Courses		Classes are taught in person (in the classroom). However, some class sessions may be held online (via Zoom). In that case, students need to attend online (via Zoom) for those classes.
Distance Learning Courses	Online	Classes are held in real-time. Classes will be taught via Zoom on the day and period indicated on the course timetable.
	On Demand	Course materials and recorded lectures are uploaded to Moodle or another platform, and students must watch them and submit any assignments within the set time period. In principle, the materials will be made available on the day and period listed on the course timetable.

(Warning about Credit Requirements) –Please be careful about the following when registering for courses by yourself from your 2nd semester onwards–

Under the Standards for the Establishment of Universities and APU’s University Regulations, the maximum number of credits from Distance Learning Courses that can be counted towards graduation is 60 credits. If a student earns more than 60 credits from applicable courses, the additional credits will not count towards the number of credits needed for graduation. ► What is GPA?

GPA is a value that represents a student's overall grade evaluation, calculated from the individual grades of their classes based on APU's specific calculation method.

Cumulative GPA:

Calculated using all grades **from enrollment to current semester**

Used for: Academic Transcripts, Student Exchange, Accelerated Graduation Program, Course Registration, etc.

Semester GPA:

Calculated using all grades **from that semester only**

Used for: Scholarship Screenings, Course Registration, etc.



Graduation Requirements & Subject Fields

► What is a Curriculum?

Your curriculum sets out your graduation requirements and the courses you can take. It is determined by the year you enroll at APU.

Your curriculum will stay the same until graduation. (Excluding cases where there is a change in student status, such as withdrawal, etc.)



Curriculum

- ST's graduation requirements change greatly depending on your enrollment language.
- **For English-basis students, your starting level for Japanese Language Subjects will be determined by the results of the Placement Test.**
- Depending on your starting level for Japanese, the number of Japanese Language credits required for graduation changes.
- Your curriculum will stay the same until graduation. (Excluding cases where there is a change in student status, such as withdrawal, etc.)

► English-basis students are required to take Japanese Language Subjects!

- Your **starting level for Japanese Language Subjects is decided** by the results of the placement test you took at enrollment.
- The university will automatically assign you to classes until you earn all the required credits.

102 Credits

- Of the 124 credits required for graduation, students need to earn 102 credits in specific subject fields.

- The remaining 22 credits do not need to be taken in a specific subject field. Please earn these credits in the fields you are interested in.

124 Credits – 102 Credits = 22 Credits
Remaining 22 credits can be from any subject field



- Depending on your starting level for Japanese, the number of required credits for "Japanese Language Subjects" and "Language Education and/or Common Liberal Arts Subjects" will change slightly, but all students are still required to earn a total of 102 credits within these specified subject fields.

ST: How to Check Your Required Credits for Graduation

- You can check your required credits for graduation as follows:
【Method】Campusmate >> Click on “Grade Report” from the Academic Menu
- In order to graduate, the number of “Completed” credits must match (or exceed) the number under “Required (adjusted)” .

What are ST Major Education Subjects?

- These subjects help students understand the goals and philosophy of ST, acquire specialized knowledge and skills, and pursue their interests.
- Most subjects can be taken from your 2nd year onwards.
- ST's Major Education Subjects are further divided into the following categories. ⇒ Use the Curriculum Outline to check which subjects are in each category.

Academic Skills		Students learn the academic skills needed to pursue their studies in ST.
ST Common Subjects	Regional Development	Students acquire the knowledge needed for sustainable regional development and planning, including endogenous development theory and land-based tourism.
	Social Entrepreneurship	Students study the knowledge needed for future business startups.
	Data Science & Information System	In these subjects, students acquire ICT skills that can be applied to tourism and a sustainable society.
Tourism Subjects	Tourism Studies	These subjects cover theories related to tourism from a sociological point of view based on sociological, anthropological, and historical backgrounds.
	Tourism Industry Operations	Students comprehensively study the latest theories, trends, and the social background of various forms of tourism as well as the structure of the tourism industry.

2-1. What is Course Registration?

► **Course Registration is:**

- Expressing yourself and choosing which classes you want to take.
- The most important part of your academic planning.
- Something you must do to attend class, earn credits, and graduate.

DO NOT register for courses you do not plan to take, as this may block other students who want to take the course from registering.

► **Courses are arranged in order by year level, starting from the basics**

Courses are arranged in order, starting with the basics, with subjects aimed at 1st-year students, then 2nd-year students, and so on.

Please check each subject's "**Semester**", "**Subject Field**", "**Prerequisite Subjects**", and "**Course Registration Restrictions**" and think carefully about what area you want to focus on before systemically registering for your courses.



Preparation for Course Registration Guidance (Study Plan Worksheet)

Course registration is the process of choosing and registering for the classes you want to take. It is the most important process for deciding your study plan, and something you must do to attend classes, earn credits, and graduate. Students need to register for courses each semester.

In the Course Registration Guidance Session on Wednesday, April 3, you will have the opportunity to actually create your ideal timetable while checking the Subject List and each subject's syllabus. It is important to have an understanding of the points you need to bear in mind when making your timetable, so please complete STEP 1 to STEP 3 on this worksheet before attending the Course Registration Guidance Session. Please make sure to bring this worksheet with you to the Course Registration Guidance Session.

STEP 1: Think about your 4-year study plan

What do you want to study at APU? What interests you at the moment? What kind of career do you want in the future? It doesn't matter if its something you are just considering or a vague idea. Write down what comes to mind.

STEP 3: Check the course content using the syllabus

It is impossible to know what you will study and the format of classes from the subject name alone. Carefully read through the syllabus to check what content you want to study. If you make a note of the course content and evaluation method, it will be easy for you to check back afterwards.

- Check the day and period for your automatically-registered subjects and confirm your free periods and how many credits you can register by yourself. (The day and period of automatically-registered subjects cannot be changed.)

2. Check the syllabus, subject list, and course timetable

- Use the syllabus, subject list, and course timetable to research information about the subjects you want to register in your open class periods. (*Make sure to check the information for your curriculum.)
- Syllabus: Check the information about course content, grading method, and recommended qualifications/knowledge, and think about which subjects you want to take.
- Subject List: Check the semester available, prerequisites, and course registration restrictions to see if you can register for the courses you are interested in.
- Course Timetable: Check if the subject you want to take is offered in the current semester. Subjects that are not included on the course timetable are not available that semester.

3. Make a (tentative) timetable

- Make a tentative timetable based on 1 and 2
- We recommend making several tentative timetables in case you are unable to register for your first-choice subjects during course registration.

4. Register for your courses during course registration

- Register for courses on Campusmate.



