- The Spring Semester starts in April, and the Fall Semester starts in October.
- A session is a weeklong class period at the beginning of each of the long vacations.



Fall Semester: Classes are taught over 2 months, either from October to November (1st Quarter) or from December to January (2nd Quarter)

Course Formats

Courses are offered in one of two formats: "In-person" or "Distance Learning (Online/On Demand)".

Please check both the syllabus and course timetable for information about the class format for each course.

Course Format		How to Attend Classes
In-person Courses		Classes are taught in person (in the classroom). However, some class sessions may be held online (via Zoom). In that case, students need to attend online (via Zoom) for those classes.
Distance	Online	Classes are held in real-time. Classes will be taught via Zoom on the day and period indicated on the course timetable.
Learning Courses	On Demand	Course materials and recorded lectures are uploaded to Moodle or another platform, and students must watch them and submit any assignments within the set time period. In principle, the materials will be made available on the day and period listed on the course timetable.

(Warning about Credit Requirements) –Please be careful about the following when registering for courses by yourself from your 2nd semester onwards–
Under the Standards for the Establishment of Universities and APU's University Regulations, the maximum number of credits from Distance Learning Courses that can be counted towards graduation is 60 credits. If a student earns more than 60 credits from applicable courses, the additional credits will not count towards the number of credits needed for graduation. Cumulative GPA and Semester GPA

▶ What is GPA?

GPA is a value that represents a student's overall grade evaluation, calculated from the individual grades of their classes based on APU's specific calculation method.

Cumulative GPA:

Calculated using all grades from enrollment to current semester

Used for: Academic Transcripts, Student Exchange, Accelerated Graduation Program, Course Registration, etc.

Semester GPA:

Calculated using all grades from that semester only

Used for: Scholarship Screenings, Course Registration, etc.

- The remaining 22 credits do not need to be taken in a specific subject field. Please earn these credits in the fields you are interested in.


124 Credits – 102 Credits = 22 Credits

What are ST Major Education Subjects?

- These subjects help students understand the goals and philosophy of ST, acquire specialized knowledge and skills, and pursue their interests.
- Most subjects can be taken from your 2nd year onwards.
- ST's Major Education Subjects are further divided into the following categories. ⇒ Use the Curriculum Outline to check which subjects are in each category.

Academic Skills		Students learn the academic skills needed to pursue their studies in ST.
	Regional Development	Students acquire the knowledge needed for sustainable regional development and planning, including endogenous development theory and land-based tourism.
ST Common Subjects	Social Entrepreneurship	Students study the knowledge needed for future business startups.
	Data Science & Information System	In these subjects, students acquire ICT skills that can be applied to tourism and a sustainable society.
	Tourism Studies	These subjects cover theories related to tourism from a sociological point of view based on sociological, anthropological, and historical backgrounds.
Tourism Subjects	Tourism Industry Operations	Students comprehensively study the latest theories, trends, and the social background of various forms of tourism as well as the structure of the tourism industry.
	Hospitality Operation	These subjects teach the theory and practice of hospitality to deepen students' understanding of tourism-related industries and business, such as the service, hotel, resort, and food industries.
	Environmental Studies	In these subjects, students comprehensively study basic knowledge and theories concerning the relationship between humans and the environment, including changes in people's behavior regarding global environmental conservation and global issues such as biodiversity, the marine plastic issue, as well as pollution and climate change caused by human activity like air and water pollution.
Sustainable Society Subjects	Resource Management	Students learn about the basic theories and methods for realizing a resource-recycling society, particularly recycling-oriented economies and low-carbon societies.
	International Development	These subjects focus on the social and economic factors needed to achieve international sustainable development. Students study both theoretical aspects of international development, such as politics for development, sociology, anthropology, economics, and policy, as well as practical aspects, including the role of international organizations and various methods for cooperative development.
Off-Campus Program Subjects		These subjects involve practical experience off campus.

 DO NOT register for courses you do not plan to take, as this may block other students who want to take the course from registering.
- ► Courses are arranged in order by year level, starting from the basics







Website / Online Materials

Graduation requirements for each college, subjects available to all students (Language Subjects, etc.), and other important academic information.



Syllabus

Professors provide information about the course plan to students, including course content, grading method, and other important information.



Subject List

This contains important information you need when registering for courses, including course registration restrictions and which semester subjects are available from.

*Includes subjects that aren't offered every semester.



Course Timetable

A list of all the courses offered that semester with information about the day, period, classroom, etc. Subjects not included on the list are not available that semester.

1. Check the timetable for your automatically-registered subjects

- The timetable for your automatically-registered subjects will be sent as an Excel file to the "Action Required" section on Campus Terminal from the day before course registration.
- Check the day and period for your automatically-registered subjects and confirm your free periods and how many credits you can register by yourself. (The day and period of automatically-registered subjects cannot be changed.)

2. Check the syllabus, subject list, and course timetable

- Use the syllabus, subject list, and course timetable to research information about the subjects you want to register in your open class periods. (*Make sure to check the information for your curriculum.)
- Syllabus: Check the information about course content, grading method, and recommended qualifications/knowledge, and think about which subjects you want to take.
- Subject List: Check the semester available, prerequisites, and course registration restrictions to see if you can register for the courses you are interested in.
- Course Timetable: Check if the subject you want to take is offered in the current semester. Subjects that are not included on the course timetable are not available that semester.

3. Make a (tentative) timetable

- Make a tentative timetable based on 1 and 2
- We recommend making several tentative timetables in case you are unable to register for your first-choice subjects during course registration.

4. Register for your courses during course registration

Class Cancellations & Make-up Classes

- Classes may be cancelled if the instructor is unwell, due to weather conditions, etc.
- If a class is cancelled, then a make-up class will be held on one of the designated make-up class days. (Make sure to keep your schedule free on days marked as "Make-up Classes" on the Academic Calendar.)
- Information about class cancellations and make-up classes is posted to Campus Terminal.

- At university, in principle students communicate with their instructors directly. (Questions, class absences, etc.)
- Please use the following methods to consult your instructors if you have any questions or doubts about your classes.
 - Consult your instructor in the classroom either before or after class
 - Send questions by email (Check their contact information from the syllabus, on the office hours page, or in class)
 - Use office hours (The hours when professors are available for consultation in their office. Check the time on the office hours webpage.)
- Part-time professors do not have their own office. Please ask any questions by email or in class.

- These courses are the courses automatically registered for you by the university, but please note that the class details are not yet final.
- The Academic Office will make announcements regarding classes and timetables on Campus Terminal so please check Campus Terminal for more information.



Course Number

The course number indicates the position of the subject within the curriculum and the curriculum's overall organization. Please refer to this number on the syllabus when planning your systematic course registration.





POINTS of Note



[Semester]

The semester from which the subject is available to students. You can register for this subject if you are in the semester listed or higher.

[Prerequisite Subjects]

You cannot register for this subject unless you have already earned credits for the subjects listed here. If you have not earned credits for the set prerequisite subjects, then you cannot register for the subject even if you meet the semester requirements. Prerequisite subjects differ for JST/JAT/E students.

[Course Registration Restrictions]

Lists any restrictions on registering for that subject.

This column notes which subjects are automatically registered by APU, when students can register for the subject, and if there any restrictions related to language basis.

Materials 4: Course Timetable

What is the Course Timetable?

- The Course Timetable lists all the courses offered for the current semester, including information about the day, class period, classroom, etc.
- Subjects not listed on the current course timetable are not offered that semester.
 - *The timetable for Session Subjects is announced separately




